

## Psychological Therapies, Medication and Psychosis: How do they relate to one another?

## An important action-provoking one-day Conference organised by the ISPS UK

The next ISPS national conference provides an ideal opportunity to hear from international speakers on the most effective approaches to aide our understanding of the interactions between talking therapies and medication. Psychological approaches are used for many different things and the speakers will explore how psychological therapies may be used to best effect, and how medication integrates with these approaches. For example some therapies may have identical aims as medication - e.g. to 'simply' reduce hallucinations, whilst others might have different or even opposing aims - e.g. to reduce stress on mind vs to increase capacity to manage stress. The conference will hear from leaders in the field who will help us challenge traditional thinking in this area and identify future steps that professionals, service users and their families can take together so that with improved understanding and dialogue we might better improve the chances of integrating these often divergent approaches to treatment within one that supports an individual's recovery.
